The action plan of the 2010 NPT Review Conference established three key principles of disarmament: transparency, verification, and irreversibility. As the latter has remained underdeveloped, Wilton Park organised a conference, co-funded by the FCDO and the Norwegian MFA, on Irreversibility in Nuclear Disarmament (IND) in March 2022. Following on from the NPT Review Conference in August, where the draft Final Document stated that "States parties" recognise that further work is required to ensure the irreversibility of nuclear disarmament and, as a first step, are encouraged to build an understanding of the application of irreversibility measures in attaining and maintaining a world free of nuclear weapons and to exchange information on the application of the principle of irreversibility in relation to the implementation of their Treaty obligations", this Wilton Park dialogue will assess how to take IND forward. The dialogue, convened in partnership with the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the UK Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office, thereby aims to further develop detailed thinking on the concept of IND, as well as its political, legal, practical, and technical aspects. This meeting will hence take up the challenge set out at the Review Conference to build shared understandings among NPT States Parties and advance the prospects for nuclear disarmament.

Goals and objectives

- To assess the spectrum of positions on IND and work towards a shared understanding of what IND will require.
- Based on commissioned original research, to identify and discuss the political, legal, practical, and technical aspects and criteria for irreversibility, both during a process of disarmament, and after disarmament has been achieved.
- To explore options for a programme of work and avenues for taking IND work forward that will include next steps and fora for collaboration.

Participants representing NGOs will split into two groups led by Andreas Persbo and Wilfred Wan. Discussions will address the following questions:

- In view of the research presented at this conference, what are the next steps to take IND work forward? Which aspects require continued attention and further research?
- What type of support is needed from governments to enable continued work on irreversibility? How can funding and government-organised meetings promote and aid research efforts?
- Would irreversibility research relate to and interact with other disarmament research programmes?
- Could regional coordination advance irreversibility research?
